At the conclusion of each passing year, we are afforded the opportunity to look backward and forward at the same time. We take the time to consider the accomplishments of our year ending and pledge to be better versions of ourselves in the year ahead. Some years we make progress towards that better version of ourselves, and other years we break our “new year’s resolution” within a few weeks. The perspective on our year is often from the lens we see ourselves, rather than from the lens with which others see us. This year as I took stock of the “year in the life of our Levine JCC,” I challenged myself to take time to see it through the faces of our LJCC membership. Our job is to uncover those seventy faces. Another sage, Ben Bag Bag says in Pirkei Avot 5:22, “*Hafoch ba ve hafoch ba dekula ba*,” “Turn it over and over, for all is within it” - these two perspectives remind us that there is an inherent multi-vocal nature of life, of community, and of Torah. We are reminded that each individual experience invites many interpretive possibilities of the same reality.

Our tradition demands that we consider, we read, and reread the stories each year. Each year we gain a new perspective.

So, I tasked myself for the coming year to see how many of the “seventy faces of the LJCC” I might be able to uncover, while only having the opportunity to “read” them one at a time. The true richness of Torah study is the ability to appreciate the unique insight of each of the seventy faces, and thus the true richness of our LJCC Community comes only in the appreciation of each individual, each “face” of our J. When we truly consider the depth and breadth of our community, we are granted access to the full depth of its beauty.

As you look back and forward, I invite you to join me in the task of getting to know the individuals who make up our community. If you do not yet know the person running on the treadmill beside you, or the family that is enrolled in swimming lessons at the same time as your child, or the person eating next to you in the JCAFÉ, or the family behind you in the pick-up line for JTEAM, take a moment to introduce yourself and get to know them. Bosom Buddies Benefit

The Bosom Buddies Benefit is an annual tennis event in Charlotte which raises money for the fight against cancer.

The Bosom Buddies event was first held in 2005 at Weddington Swim & Racquet Club. In 2013 Greg O'Connor, Levine JCC Director of Tennis, along with the support of JCC member Tammy Golder and Bosom Buddies President Cyndi Thilo, brought the event to the Levine JCC.

Each year, between 70 to 90 players participate at the Levine JCC. In return for a generous donation, all players participate in 3.5 hours of tennis clinics hosted by Greg, Coach Bob, Coach Randy, and area teaching professionals. After a stellar workout on the tennis courts, all players attend a catered luncheon which includes a raffle, silent auction, and guest speakers. The speakers include survivors, experts in the field, and many of those who have benefitted from the organization's philanthropy.





Recognizing Our Butterfly Project Volunteers


Approximately 6,000 students from CMS and surrounding counties come to the Levine JCC annually to participate in a Levine JCC Butterfly Project workshop. The 2-1/2 hour interactive experience is focused on teaching the lessons of the Holocaust – how to identify and combat prejudice, stereotyping, and discrimination, and to promote activism. The Levine JCC Butterfly Project – celebrating its 10th anniversary in 2018 – would not have experienced the tremendous success it has without the help of its many volunteers.

In 2008, a small group of passionate and dedicated volunteers brought the idea to Charlotte and then took off running with it. Those volunteers raised money, made ceramic butterflies in the LJCC ceramics studio, developed a program, and went out to schools and other community organizations, all with a goal of painting 2,000 ceramic butterflies in memory of children who were killed in the Holocaust. In that first year, they surpassed their goal by 50%!

In November of 2011, the greatly enhanced Levine JCC Butterfly Project Workshop was brought home to Shalom Park. Busloads of students arrive each week to participate in the workshops. The number of participating students grew from 991 participants in the 2011-12 academic year to almost 6,000 per year since 2014-15. In support of a few part-time staff, volunteers are vital in the delivery of the workshops. Five to six volunteers are needed for each workshop – which serves 100 students per day, three days a week, September to May. Simply said, volunteers are the backbone of this program!



"I feel like I help spread the word that might not otherwise be heard and it gives me a chance to connect on a very basic human level."



During the 2017-18 academic year, approximately 40 people regularly volunteered with the Levine JCC Butterfly Project, giving roughly 750 hours of their time. While the Butterfly Project could not operate without these wonderful, dedicated volunteers, what makes this project stand out is that not only is the Butterfly Project benefitting from the volunteers, but the volunteers are benefitting from the Butterfly Project. This is best described in the words of the volunteers themselves:

"Along with the children, I've learned a great deal. I look forward to coming each week and am proud to be a presenter. I think it's a great project."

"I love working with the students and seeing the impact this program has on them. The reflection cards are a great way to see what they got out of the program."

"Being a volunteer enables me to give back to a younger generation knowledge of how to be a kind, caring and loving citizen and part of the Jewish community."

"Thankful for the opportunity to have a small role in such an important endeavor. The next generation cannot remember what they do not know. Perhaps as adults, these children will use what they have learned here to make a positive impact on society, bringing us to hope "never again."

"I volunteer because it is a way to continue educating children about the Holocaust. I love how the children learn about tolerance."

"The Butterfly Project is very important to me because it gives me the opportunity to be involved in my community. I feel it is extremely important to educate students to the importance of tolerance and respect for everyone."

"I often am confused on who derives the greater good. The Butterfly Project or the satisfaction I receive. Keeping the memory alive of the Holocaust is vital."

"I have taught the Holocaust for 36+ years. Why do I volunteer? Because a survivor once told me when I was 23 I am an empath and it was my responsibility to tell the stories so they are not forgotten. After Charlottesville, there was no choice. This year working with these students has been inspiring - especially the "ah-ha" moments when the connection to today - bullying or bias or prejudice. When they begin to see the importance of taking a stand, of making a difference, of making "never again" real. And when they ask questions of Suly and Irving - "you were our age - weren't you afraid of being all by yourself? Of dying? Of being caught?"

"The Holocaust was a tragedy. The tragedy today is how many people believe this never happened. It is of utmost importance that this story be told and we continue to educate these kids about this event."

ENRICH * ENLIGHTEN * ENJOY

The Levine JCC is the single largest Jewish organization in North and South Carolina. Oasis, our senior enrichment program, serves adults 50 and over, offering programming focused on health and wellness to one of the region's largest pools of Jewish senior adults. Most of the seniors utilizing Oasis services live alone and independently, and many are unable to drive. Oasis provides the only free senior center transportation service in the Charlotte area.

Often our seniors move to Charlotte from larger Jewish communities where they naturally felt a sense of "belonging" without much effort. Oasis helps bridge the gap of "belonging" and assists our community's seniors in feeling "at home" in their Charlotte Jewish community. Oasis programming emphasizes Judaism and Jewish values and offers vast and varied programming to meet the needs of all seniors, with over 1,000 programs per year, including wellness seminars, enrichment activities, exercise, and a kosher lunch program.

The LJCC provides more than \$200,000 in scholarships each year, ensuring that no one is turned away due to financial hardships and that all members are able to participate in a myriad of programs. A great many of these need-based scholarships are extended to seniors in our community who are in their 70s, 80s, and 90s. These scholarships provide Oasis membership, meals, health and wellness programming, and free transportation to many of our community's underserved seniors.

Over the past several years, local, county, state, and national organizations have eliminated or shifted their grant funds away from Senior programs like Oasis. In fact, Oasis used to receive the majority of its funding from these sources. Unfortunately, municipalities and organizations like Mecklenburg County and the United Way of Central Carolinas have eliminated Oasis from their funding grants.

As average life expectancy continues to increase, Oasis is now more dependent than ever on the generosity of individual donors and organizations like the BJH Foundation, who together with individual and family donors, make up the only funding stream for Oasis. It is important that Jewish seniors in the Greater Charlotte area are able to enjoy a vibrant Jewish life while they age. Oasis is that place for health, wellness, and socialization for so many in our community.



Ensuring Our Seniors' Healthy Future.

"Leigh Jacobson '51 was a very outgoing, energetic person. She had a good heart and had the most amazing smile. She worked many years as a Mortgage Underwriter but had a passion for golf and fitness. Through the years she taught fitness classes to small children and adults. From 2008-2014 she taught exercise classes to our Oasis Senior Enrichment group. She wanted to grow the senior exercise program at the LJCC, so she began teaching chair exercises and had great success."



Leigh's husband, Bob, wanted to honor Leigh's passion for fitness and senior exercise. He established an endowment for the LJCC in Leigh's name which will benefit the Oasis senior exercise programs in perpetuity. His generosity,

along with the generosity of others who have donated to the endowment, will ensure that new fitness equipment and an increase in the number of classes offered are no longer "needs," rather they are realities for our Seniors.

Leigh and Bob Jacobson believe in giving back. For this reason they are Legacy Donors to the Jewish Federation of Greater Charlotte and volunteered together at Huntingtowne Farms Elementary School, a beneficiary of our Shalom Park Freedom School. Bob continues to volunteer at Huntingtowne Farms, Freedom School, Jewish Family Services, and the Levine-Sklut Judaic Library and Resource Center on a weekly basis.

Bob came to the LJCC with a desire to honor Leigh's legacy. The LJCC was proud to partner with Bob to ensure her legacy and ensure a healthier life for our Seniors through her Legacy.

A Day Benefitting & Honoring Our Community's Seniors

Each year, members of the Levine JCC come together to celebrate the life and legacy of Sam Strause ש"ר and raise funds to benefit the Levine JCC Oasis senior enrichment program. This year's event, chaired by Arthur Lavitt and Mike Van Glish, gathered a hundred community members on the course to benefit and honor our Seniors.

This tournament truly embodies the vision that Lisa Strause Levinson had when she set up the Alene ש"ר and Sam ש"ר Strause Family Endowment for the Levine Jewish Community Center, with additional support from the LJCC and community donors, and in memory of her parents. Alene and Sam believed in taking care of the members of this

community, and their daily actions reflected this belief. The endowment ensures that these needs will be met for generations to come.

Proceeds from the tournament have a tremendous impact on the Levine JCC Oasis senior enrichment program and our senior participants. The mission of the Oasis program is to enrich the quality of life for all senior participants regardless of religious affiliation. Sponsorships, player fees, and donations to the Sam Strause Levine JCC Invitational Golf Tournament benefit the Oasis program, which touches families and individuals in tangible and profound ways that truly make a difference in peoples' lives. These dollars directly subsidize nutritional kosher lunches, fund the free transportation service, and sponsor programming, all designed to enhance

the lives of seniors in our community who could not otherwise afford to participate. For many seniors, the Levine JCC's Oasis program is their only contact with the community, giving access to a nourishing meal, a health check, any type of physical activity, or other life-sustaining services.



June 2, 2017 was the day I received a phone call from my doctor saying, "I am so sorry but you have breast cancer." Not a phone call you ever expect to receive. When I went to my oncologist the following week I was told I have an aggressive form of breast cancer called triple negative. It is rare, but the good news is it normally responds well to chemotherapy, but unfortunately there is no pill to take when you are done. I was in SHOCK and extremely SCARED! The doctor told me I would also need surgery and radiation to give me the best chance to live.

I went into survival mode as best I could, which included opening myself up to my friends and family and going through the journey together!



I had been doing JFORCE for about 6 years and it truly had become a second family to me! I couldn't believe how that actually became my safe place. I went in there with a bald head and sometimes had absolutely no energy. I knew I could walk in the room and have the love of everyone in there cheering me on and helping me get through whatever I could do that day...which many times wasn't much! This helped keep my spirits up which as my doctors would say, kept my immune system stronger.

My journey has been so humbling. I couldn't believe how many people wanted to go to chemo with me to sit and keep me company. It truly takes a village!

Three months into my journey Maria from JFORCE also got diagnosed with triple negative breast cancer! How crazy?



I wanted to be there for her during her journey also. Others who walked by the JFORCE room must have thought being bald must be the new thing (haha)!

Missy Schomaker, the JFORCE trainer, has really created an environment that is so welcoming and non-judgmental to everyone who participates.

I am now six months out of treatment and feeling strong! Going through this journey has really changed my outlook on life. I try and always have a smile on my face and I hope through my experience I can help others get through tough times a little easier.

We are all so lucky to have the J in Charlotte. It really is such an amazing, caring, and safe environment.

My journey started September 2017 when I was diagnosed with breast cancer. My life became divided into before and after. What I knew about cancer was what most of people usually do – it makes you weak and makes you lose desire even for basic needs. But luckily for me (it's hard to use the word "luck" in this context), I found a great example of inspiration, motivation, and tremendously hard worker, Susan Kent. Susan is a been-there, done-that survivor, who received her diagnosis just a few months before.

She became my mentor, gave me tons of support, care, and advice. I saw her coming to JFORCE and doing a great job every day in spite of going through chemo. I remember running one day on the track, and I still couldn't catch up with her. She was just that amazing! Susan's example showed me I could make it!

I would like to thank Missy Schomaker and the entire JFORCE team for all the support you gave me, for the hugs, and hospital visits! **BOOM** - You are the best! I would like to thank the ladies at the customer service desk who always greeted me with a smile and best wishes. My special thanks go to the Chai Hopes knitters sitting in the lobby every Wednesday who donated their hats to people going through chemotherapy at Levine Cancer Institute. I'm grateful to be a part of the LJCC community.

It was a hard, but still an amazing journey to the new me – more fulfilled, more confident, much happier, and in more harmony with myself; a journey where you learn not to give up, learn that your mind and body are strong, and there's nothing impossible. If you find yourself going through this journey, know that you are not alone and there's always support. Sometimes you need to fall before you fly.
